Happy New Year and welcome to 2025.

On 14 February 1925, Australian Army Order 71 was issued stating that "Approval has been given for the Signal Engineer Units of the Citizen Forces to be formed into a separate Corps, designated the Australian Corps of Signals", that later became the Royal Australian Corps of Signals.

This year, we celebrate a century of service by generations of Sigs who have served our nation in war and peace with great distinction.

Certa Cito 100 gives us an opportunity to commemorate on the proud history of the Corps and to reflect on the legacy of all those Sigs who have served over the last 100 years.

In NSW, we will launch Certa Cito 100 at the North Bondi RSL, 118-120 Ramsgate Avenue, North Bondi on Friday 14 February 2025 from 6.00pm to 11.00pm.

Thanks to the assistance of North Bondi RSL, the launch will consist of a cocktail function that includes a threehour drinks package, with a range of canapés, for a modest price of \$58.

For the Sydney 2025 Anzac Day march, RA Sigs will march at the front of the Army contingent, behind the Commander Forces Command. This will involve current serving personnel from all RA Sigs units in NSW, plus the RA Sigs Association and former members of the Corps.

## Transfer of the Defence Force School of Signals

On 20 January 2025, the Chief of Army issued an Order of the Day transferring the Defence Force School of Signals, the Defence Force School of Intelligence, the Defence Force School of Policing and the Defence Force School of Music from the Australian Army to the command of Joint Capabilities Group (JCG). Joint Capabilities Group will be renamed as Joint Training Command.

The transfer of these training establishments is considered to be an important milestone in achieving the transformation of the Australian Defence Force, as directed by the 2024 National Defence Strategy.

# DARING DEEDS Captain Lionel Matthews

On 2 March 2015, the Memorial accepted the donation of a George Cross which had been posthumously awarded to Captain Lionel Colin Matthews for extreme and selfless courage while a prisoner of war. The George Cross is ranked just behind the Victoria Cross and is awarded for acts of extreme bravery performed by civilians and military personnel when not under enemy fire. It is no longer awarded to Australians, as it was superseded in 1975 by the Australian Cross of Valour.

Matthews was already serving in the Australian Military Forces (AMF) when war was declared in 1939, having served with the Civilian Military Forces from 1935, followed by the Royal Australian Navy Volunteer Reserve and 3rd Division Signals, AMF. On 28 July 1940, he was seconded to the Australian Imperial Force and transferred to 8 Division Signals as a lieutenant. There, he was personally selected by Lieutenant Colonel Thyer to command the Wireless Operating section, known as 'Eddy' Section, which was responsible for artillery brigade communications. 'Eddy' Section and the rest of the division embarked aboard Queen Mary on 2 February 1941, bound for Malaya. 'Eddy' Section was moved to Malacca on arrival in Malaya, and was responsible for communications back to the Divisional Headquarters for 2/10 Field Regiment.

During the Japanese invasion of Malaya in December 1941, Matthews earned a Military Cross for maintaining communications while under heavy fire and bombardment at Gemas. He was promoted to Captain just before the surrender in February 1942 and was among more than 15,000 Australian soldiers who were captured and imprisoned at the fall of Singapore. The ribbon of the Military Cross – a spare belonging to a fellow internee





- was presented to him at a ceremony in Changi prisoner of war camp on 10 May 1942.

Prisoners were soon dispersed to other regions in work parties. On 8 July 1942 Matthews became part of 'B' Force, a work party of almost 1,500 men which was sent by ship to Borneo and imprisoned at Sandakan. Soon after arrival, Matthews was chosen as Intelligence Officer and began to direct an underground intelligence organisation from captivity. Through connections with sympathetic locals and by maintaining a secret radio, he was able to co-ordinate the provision of medical supplies to the camp, weapons deliveries from the Philippines, escapes, and readiness for an uprising against the Japanese. In July 1943, the intelligence network

was betrayed to their captors. Although Matthews had a plan of escape and a chance to flee, he chose to remain with his men and submit to arrest. Over the following

months, he was subjected to brutal interrogation but never gave away his mates. On 2 March 1944, he was brought before a Japanese military court in Kuching and sentenced to execution. In an unusual offer, possibly a sign of grudging respect by the Japanese, he was permitted to select his own means of execution. He chose firing squad and was executed the same day.

Captain Matthews was buried at Kuching but was reinterred at Labuan at the end of the war. His full Military Cross was handed to his 11-year-old son David by the Governor General in 1947, and now accompanies his George Cross and service medals.

#### SEIZING THE OPPORTUNITY OF

#### THE ROYAL COMMISSION INTO DEFENCE AND VETERAN SUICIDE

Earlier this year I gave evidence during the final hearing block of the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide. For three years, the Royal Commission has heard evidence from serving and former-serving members, and their families. The Royal Commission has examined extensive data and sought expert testimony.

The Royal Commission has noted that for most Soldiers <sup>1</sup>, service in our Army is a positive aspect of their personal and professional lives. This is an important point to acknowledge but that is not what this Royal Commission is about.

It is about those for whom service has been a negative experience, the effects of which have been life-long, life-altering and in the worst-case life-ending. The Royal Commission has heard of many such experiences, historic and recent. Our failings — whether institutional or individual — have had terrible consequences for those we have failed.

The evidence is compelling. Since 2017, for example, we know we have lost 30 sewing Soldiers either suspected or confirmed to have died by suicide<sup>2</sup>. Many more have been lost across our wider community.

This is not acceptable. We must do more. These are our people, members of our teams and our Army. To fight and win in war our teams must be built on the foundations of trust, respect, and cohesion.

Last year we identified and brought home the remains of Australian soldiers who were killed in the battle of Fromelles in 1916. This reminds us all that 'Lest we Forget' is not rhetoric, it is a promise. We continued the search for our soldiers for over a century, a commitment of which we ought to be proud.

Now is the time to apply the same approach and effort to the challenge of suicide and suicidality among our people. We will not leave our mates behind, fallen on their own personal battlefield.

This Royal Commission presents us with a once in a generation opportunity to reduce the incidence of suicide and suicidality in our community. To make a step change rather than incremental improvement. It is both our individual and collective obligation to do so.

I am ultimately accountable for Army's people, culture, mission and resources, but like everything we do — it requires a committed team effort if we are to be successful.

We need not wait for the Royal Commission to publish its findings and recommendations before we act. The opportunity exists today, and we must act on it today.

We will focus on three outcomes: achieving a measurable reduction in the incidence of suicide and suicidality amongst Soldiers; building our individual and collective resilience; and strengthening our culture. When we achieve this, we will have a stronger Army, an Army that is more capable and better able to fulfil its mission.

We must move on this effort together, as one team, and we must stay together. We train and fight in teams. Trust among our teams is our main effort.

I am grateful for all that you and your families do in service each day. I am proud to serve in an Army that owns its failures; an Army that is genuinely determined to learn from the past and committed to improving our future.

Our Army's future begins today — with each of us reflecting our values in our thoughts, words and actions today and every day.



#### A message from Head of Corps.

As 2024 draws to a close, I want to extend my heartfelt gratitude for the commitment of our serving members across the year. This year, our 99th as a Corps, has once again demonstrated the outstanding dedication, innovation, and excellence that each of you bring to our mission and purpose. You have excelled in an environment where change is the absolute constant. I would also like to acknowledge the excellent work of our Associations, Colonel Commandants and the broader Signals veteran community. It has been impressive to see the esprit de corps evident across the Signals family this year.

I would like to recognise those who will remain on duty or at short readiness, both within Australia and abroad and thank you for continuing to serve through the reduced activity period. As many others prepare to take a well-earned rest with family, friends, and loved ones, let us reflect on some of the remarkable achievements accomplished together.

The Cyber Domain has been recognised as a warfighting domain this year, highlighting the growing need for our people and capabilities across the five warfighting domains (Land, Maritime, Air, Space and Cyber). Cyber Command was established on 25 March 24 in Joint Capabilities Group as the multi-domain Group comprising of Space, Cyber and the Defence Networks. Many from our Corps have contributed to the establishment of Cyber Command, which now also includes 138th Signals Squadron transferred from the 7th Signal Regiment.

On 4 July 2024, Lieutenant General Susan Coyle, AM, CSC, DSM was appointed as Chief Joint Capabilities, the first RA Sigs 3 Star Officer. Headquarters Joint Operations Command also raised the Joint Force Cyber Component this year to plan coordinate, control and execute effects from and through the Cyber Domain in support of Theatre Operations.

20 September 2024 was the 25th anniversary of the first deployment to East Timor with the International Force East Timor (INTERFET) mission. I was pleased to commemorate the milestone and contributions with a number of others with 1st Signal Regiment.

Our training continues to evolve with the transfer of the Defence Command Support Training Centre including the Defence Force School of Signals to Joint Capabilities Group from January 2025. The new Defence School of Space and Cyber will subsume the Space and Cyber College, centralising Cyber Domain training and support for all Groups and Services.

A new Army G6 and staff function was established within Army Headquarters providing Signals advice and direction. This year also saw the development of an Electronic Warfare spine, enabling Army to better leverage these asymmetric capabilities.

From Exercise Mercury Run through to respective Brigade War-Fighter exercises this year, our people performed extremely well. This included both operational and exercise activities.

In response to the National Defence Strategy, Army has raised the 10th Brigade in Adelaide, creating demand for more signallers in that formation. The resulting review of the Corps' structures will see reinforcing of 1st Signal Regiment, 145th Signal Squadron and support to 10th Brigade.

Corps Week was again a highlight with the Defence Force School of Signals taking out the Rugby and Caduceus Cup. This year's Lieutenant and Signaller of Year Award nominees

have shown our signallers and young leaders to be an inspiration and exemplification of the strong future for our Corps. Congratulations to all nominees. This year's awards went to Lieutenant Sam Darwell of 138th Signal Squadron and Signaller Tayler Gillies of 7th Signal Regiment.

While there were many successes this year, there were also sadness. In March, Lance Corporal Jack Fitzgibbon of 126th Signal Squadron tragically died following a parachuting accident. This year also saw the passing of both David and Shelia Matthews, long servants of the Corps carrying on the legacy of David's father, Captain Lionel Matthews GC. We think of both the Fitzgibbon and Matthews families, and all those families of the Corps who lost loved ones this year.

As our 99th year draws to close it is fitting to look to 2025 as we commence a year of celebrations. On 14 February 2025, the Centenary Launch Parade will be conducted at the Shrine of Remembrance in Melbourne. I encourage all those who can attend to come along. For those who are unable to make it to Melbourne, there will be a series of events across the nation on 14 February 2025.
