As the year draws to a close, I look back over the last few years and reflect on the current Committee's achievements in addition to its traditional commemorative, fund raising and administrative tasks. In no particular order, these include but are not limited to:

It is with sincere regret that we must acknowledge the passing of Barbara Coward, Ron Koutchavlis, Herbert (Syd) Norris and Tony (Timber) Mills.

Barbara was born on 14 July 1922. She served as a driver in the WAAAF during World War 2. Barbara passed away on 23 September 2023.

Ron was born on 12 May 1945. He served in the Army as a national serviceman including a tour in South Vietnam in 1968/69. Ron also served on our Executive Committee for a number of years, until his failing health began to take its toll. Ron passed away on 26 September 2023.

Syd was born on 24 January 2023. He served in 2nd AIF in the 1st Australian Field Squadron RAE and other units during World War 2. Syd passed away on 28 September 2023.

RSL NSW State Congress

Steve Hopwood and Phil White attended the RSL NSW State Congress at Newcastle on 22-24 October 2023, as the Hornsby sub-Branch delegates. It was a relatively quiet conference. There were 20 motions considered at the Congress of these, 10 were passed, 4 were defeated, 2 were withdrawn and 4 were noted.

Advocacy Support

One issue which was raised at the RSL State Congress was the increasing number of individuals and companies offering 'fee-for-service' advocacy services in dealings with DVA. There were several horror stories of veterans suffering significant financial loss after using such services. Members should be aware that advocacy services offered by RSL Life Care Veteran Services are free. Alternatively, please speak to Phil Loomes if you need this type of support.

Member Checks

The August round of checks on members over 80 is drawing to a close. To date, we have been able to contact 61 of the 71 members who were 80 or over as at July this year. We have been unable to contact eight of the remaining ten either by phone or email but remain hopeful about the final two. Heritage

Snippets from the Past.

Reunited

While some of the focus for this year has been to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the end of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War, for two of our sub-Branch members, veterans of that conflict, it has also been an opportunity to be reunited with the equipment they operated during that conflict.

Ron Slater served in the RAAF primarily with 76 Squadron flying the Mirage jet fighter. However, Ron had also been trained as a Forward Air Controller and, in that capacity, he was posted to Vietnam from August 1969 until April 1970 where he served with the US forces flying the North American Rockwell OV-10 Bronco 14639.





14639 eventually was sent to the Philippines in the early 1990s and then 16 years ago to Australia where it arrived on HMAS Tobruk in a dishevelled state. The Australian War Memorial has been restoring this aircraft which played a key role in the Vietnam War. The Museum unveiled the fully restored Bronco on Vietnam Veterans Day this year to an

audience which included many of the former RAAF personnel who had operated her.

As a footnote to this story, in 1994, I visited the Philippines as a member of a Joint Services Staff College tour and, as we were taxiing after landing, I was able to photograph two Broncos from the tail of the C130. When the photo was taken, the aircraft had only been in the Philippines for about three years. It's interesting to speculate if 639 was one of these two.



George Main served with A and B Squadrons, 1^{st} Armoured Regiment during his time in Vietnam. George was a driver and a member of the crew of Centurion 169-043.

SITREP has previously published several photos of the tank's close encounters with the soft boggy ground of SVN, two of which are again reproduced on the following page. The photo on the left shows his tank bogged in an old rice paddy. The tank was stuck in the muck for three days. The photo on the right shows another bog which required four APCs hooked together to tow the tank out.







While undertaking research for the DVA sponsored documentaries about tank crews in Vietnam, George learnt that 169-043 not only survived the Viet Cong and his driving and but also the scrap merchant's blow torch. He located the tank on a property in Oberon, NSW where it has been carefully restored to running condition. As part of the filming, George and the other members of his crew were able to take 169-043 for a drive. Incidentally, it seems that any mishaps in Vietnam didn't damage the career of George's crew commander, then Cpl Peter Rosemond, who went on to become RSM of the Army.
